



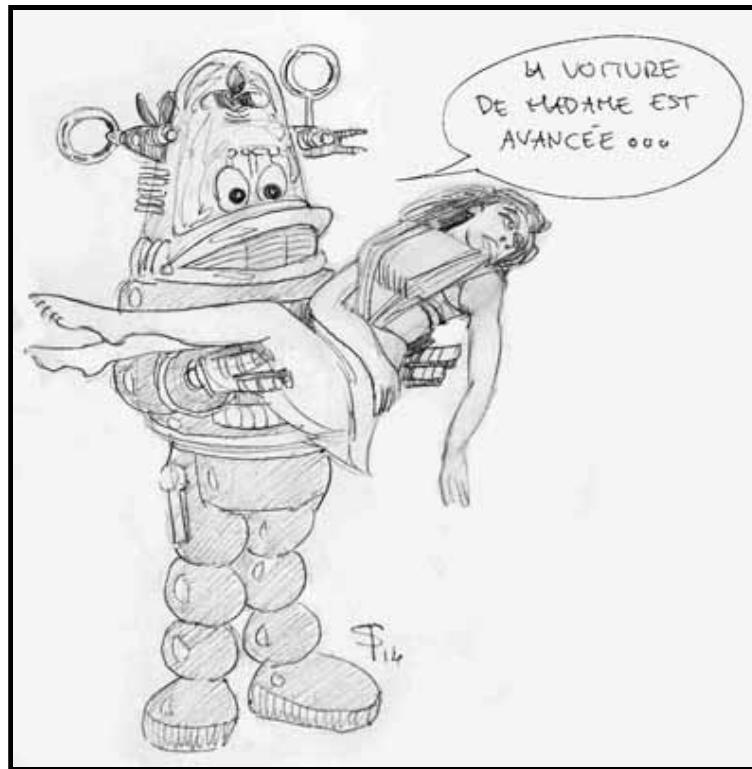

Tourné en 1955 et sorti début de l'année 1956, premier film dont la bande son était conçue à base de musique électronique. Créé par Arnold Gillespie et un autre designer - finalisé par Robert Kinoshita très proche des hi...





Created by Arnold Gillespie and another designer—and finalized by Robert Knochita, who drew heavily on Japanese folklore—the entire project was produced at MGM Studios.

The model is an old, fairly simple plastic kit that has been reissued by Polar Light in recent years...



All two-piece parts must be sanded, glued, and filled. Once sanded, the joint should be invisible...



Next, we always apply a coat of primer or paint, which reveals any imperfections...



Aside from the "shoes," footwork also consists of two parts and requires good coordination...



The side accessories have been remade from plastic. Some parts of the helmet have also been refined. The arms are in place. The seams are invisible...



The robot is assembled and glued, ready for painting...



The painting process is relatively simple. One coat of Humbrol 15 glossy midnight blue mixed with a little black. Then a highlight of glossy blue 14 to brighten up the figure. The whole thing is done with an airbrush, of course...



View from the back. The side seam on the torso is completely invisible...



The visor was coated with Klir to enhance its shine and eliminate any scratches. Painting of details and accessories. The model is finished...



Altaïra, the film's heroine, is from the Flingstone brand, which produces a few resin figurines and 1/24-scale car bodies...



While the brand stands out for the originality of its figures—especially those in 1/24 scale—the finish is, unfortunately, far from high-quality, even for a model of this size...



Anyway, after a few hours of sanding and grumbling, here's the result—ready for a coat of paint...



Winsor & Newton artist's oil paints in tubes. We always start with the flesh tones. The basics are always the same; see the relevant workshop for the technique...
